Course Overview: This course is an introduction to law. It will help you understand how legal

systems work, how lawyers and judges think, how social values impact the way laws are interpreted, and how legal rules evolve to cover new situations. It is not specific to corporate or business law, although most of the topics covered are

relevant to business.

Materials: All readings are contained in a Bulk Pack that you can obtain from Wharton

Reprographics, in the basement of Steinberg-Dietrich Hall. <u>Be sure to get the bulkpack for this year and section, as it is slightly different than others.</u>
Additional handouts will be provided during the semester. It is important that

you do the reading before each class, so that you can participate in the discussion.

Grading: This is an honors section, so it involves a substantial written and oral

presentation component. Grading will be based on two research papers (20% each), one formal oral presentation (20%), a final exam (25%), and class

participation (15%).

Papers: The papers (5-10 double-spaced pages each) will be based on course subjects and

materials, but will ordinarily require some research outside the bulkpack

readings.

Oral Presentation: The oral presentation will take the form of a mock trial. Students will be divided

into teams, and asked to prepare and present an argument on a pending Supreme Court case. The presentation will last 5-10 minutes, and will be before a "moot court" comprised of 2-3 judges. While written briefs from the case will be provided, students will be expected to do some external research. Upper-level law students will mentor students in the preparation of oral arguments.

Final Exam: The final exam will be held on Friday, December 12, from 12pm to 2pm. It will

include short answer and "issue spotter" essay questions focused primarily on the

formal legal rules covered in the class.

Class Participation: Class participation is taken seriously, and is not the same as attendance. You will

be evaluated based on the quality of your participation and the extent to which it

demonstrates preparation for the course. Completion of ungraded in-class

assignments will also be counted towards class participation.
