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OVERVIEW: This course provides an introduction to the study of law and legal process. It critically explores the role of law in modern society, providing an overview of basic functional areas, including the nature of law and competing values that inform legal decision-making, an overview of the American system of legal process, a brief "mini-course" in the substantive law of contracts, and coverage of other selected topics of current legal interest.
