BRIEFS

You are required to submit two written briefs. You may write a position paper on Subprime Mortgages as a case brief.

TAKE HOME EXAM

Each group (2 or 3 students) must submit an original case and a teaching note (answers to case), researched and written by the entire group. The case should be similar in length and detail (no more than 5 double spaced pages) to the cases assigned in the course. All cases must be submitted to the instructor (via email barry_roberts@unc.edu) no later than 5 pm on December 9, 2013. The teaching note shall not exceed 3 double spaced pages.

Guidelines for Ethics Briefs

Date of Submission: You must hand in each of your written ethics briefs by the beginning of the class during which that ethics case is to be discussed.

Length: Briefs must *not* exceed **750** words. Briefs exceeding the maximum word length will not be graded. Briefs must be typed, **double spaced**, and in a type size of **at least** 12 points.

Cover Page: Please attach a cover sheet with the course number, your name, and your student identification number. Identify the rest of your brief with your student identification number but **not** your name.

Grading: You will be graded on the basis of the following attributes of your brief:

- 1. content,
- 2. cogency,
- 3. concision, and
- 4. clarity.

Group Work: You may analyze and discuss the assigned ethics cases with other students; however, you must write your own brief and you may not read or compare briefs prior to submitting your brief for grading.

Basic Format: You should identify and address only the one or two most important issues raised by the ethics case. Do not waste words restating the facts but use the facts to frame or resolve issues. In writing your brief you should include the following elements:

- 1. Identify the most important issues
- 2. Identify the viable options
- 3. Analyze the ethical implications of the options
- 4. Reach a definite resolution of the issues
- 5. Justify logically your resolution
- 6. Discuss implementing steps and strategies
