FNCE 100: Corporate Finance

Meets Tu & Thu at 1:30pm in G60-JMHH

1 Course Description

The purpose of this course is to introduce techniques of financial analysis, with applications to corporate finance. The concepts developed in Finance 100 form the foundation for all elective finance courses. The main topics covered include (1) the time value of money and the net present value rule; (2) the valuation of bonds and stocks; (3) principles of capital budgeting; (4) uncertainty, and the tradeoff between risk and return; (5) corporate financing and dividend policy; and (6) options.

My offering of this class includes a brief introduction (with applications) to capital markets in every topic.

Knowledge of very basic statistics and simple regression analysis is presumed: familiarity w Microsoft Excel or other spreadsheet program will be useful.

Text & Course Material

- Required: Course notes, links to relevant articles and sample exams that will be made available on CANVAS.
- Required: Corporate Finance: The CORE by Joel Berk and Peter DeMarzo, Pearson, 4th Ed. You should have access to this book. I treat it as companion reading...it will round out your knowledge. Most of the text is easy reading; many of the problems are very easy, esp if you've read the text, and I will suggest that you work out selected Problems that are more challenging. So...if you do choose to purchase the text, you may also wish to purchase the solutions manual, although I plan to place at least one copy on Lippincott Reserve by the second week's end.
- A scientific or business calculator. It will be necessary for your calculator to have a x^y function. Most calculators have the basic financial functions you need:: on your work at home it's best to have access to Excel and MyFinanceLab

Course Requirements

Your COURSE GRADE will depend on your performance on:

- FIVE PROBLEM SETS on MyFinLab which add up to 10%, These are due by 5pm on the following Mondays: 23 Jan, 6 Feb, 27 Feb, 20 Mar, 3 Apr.
- One small computer ASSIGNMENT, to be done in groups of no more than three students, that will count for 5%, in which you will compute measures of risk, and value a chosen firm's equity, and assess its cost of capital:
- TWO MIDTERMS (30% each) that will count for 60%. They are closed-book and closed notes, with a calculator and one page of formulas only.
- A FINAL EXAM given in the final exam period, on FRIDAY 5 May at 3pm which counts for 24%; closed-book, closed notes, a calculator allowed, but no formula sheet.

Exam Schedule

- Midterm 2: Wednesday, 12 Apr, 6:10 to 8:15pm
- Final Exam: Friday, May 5, 3-5pm.

These dates are <u>lapidary</u> – written in stone!! All exams are closed book, closed notes – bring a calculator, some pens, and immobilise – drowning is OK! – your cell-phone.

All exams are cumulative – i.e. they will cover material upto and including the week before the exam; Midterm 2 will emphasise the material covered after Midterm 1, but the final exam will stress the whole course!

There are no make-up dates for midterms.... The make-up date for the Final follows University policy and will take place the following semester.

All regrade requests must be made in writing within one week of the day the exams are returned. Any exam submitted for regrading of a question will be subjected to a complete regrading. You should NOT engage the TAs in any discussion related to grading or regrade requests... direct all those questions to me.

Prob Sets & Assignment

You cannot work in groups on the MyFinLab problem sets! The MyFinLab Interactive Prob Sets follow the text closely, so you should be able to do them with relative ease, If you have any confusion, you can discuss the line of attack with a colleague or the TAs, but you must work on them interactively before submitting them yourself, in a straight-backed chair with several sharp pencils and a wet towel nearby. They are graded automatically. If you didn't do the Problem Set yourself, skip it; don't get someone to do it for you. If you miss the deadline for the Problem Set, MyFinLab will not accept your late attempt, and I have no control over it! Here's some motivation: diligent working on the Problem Sets will prepare you well for a large part of each exam; the examples and discussion in class will be deeper, and mastering that content will prepare you for the rest of the exam.

The computer assignment is to be completed and handed in by groups of at most three students. It's a small assignment (5-7 pages including exhibits), but much is learned by working as a team on the data assembly and Excel. it's small enough in the time commitment needed and it is worth only 5% – that I will randomly assign you to groups of three. That assignment is due on 24 April by noon.
