BEPP 250, Fall 2019 Managerial Economics

This is a course in intermediate microeconomics. Microeconomics is the scientific study of social behavior with a focus on economic issues. Microeconomics is based on three principles: individuals respond to incentives, individual behavior aggregates into equilibrium social behavior, and we can use normative criteria to find desirable outcomes.

The goals of the course are to master microeconomics and to apply microeconomics to problems in business, policy, and social science. Have you wondered: "How should Uber set prices?"; "How does trade with China affect American manufacturing?", "Why are Playstation games expensive while Sony sells the console at cost?", "Should income tax rates for millionaires be 75%?", "Should Spotify start charging per song?", "Why did Apple design iOS and manufacture iPhones, while Google built Android, but until recently, did not sell phones?" These are the types of questions we will consider.

Grading

Grades depend on attendance (5%), problem sets (10%), two midterms (25% each), and a final exam (35%).

<u>Problem Sets</u>: There will be 7 problem sets. Problem sets should be uploaded as a .pdf on Canvas by 11:59PM on the due date, always on a Sunday. See the schedule for due dates. No credit is given for late submissions. Solutions are posted the day after the due date. **Students are free to work together but must submit their own answers.**

<u>Exams</u>: Exams are closed book. You do not need a calculator and do not have to bring one. Exams will be consistent with our problem sets, problems in lectures, and practice problems, so making sure to master these problems is the best way to prepare.

Resources

<u>Lecture and Practice Problems</u>: Each lecture covers a topic and solves a problem. After each lecture we will post a practice problem with solutions, and the problem set will have a problem related to the lecture. The exams are extremely consistent with these problems. Mastering the lecture content and problems is the best way to prepare for the exams.

Recitation: Recitations are taught by our graduate TAs, and will cover problems and the class content of the week. Attendance is required. See the schedule for dates.

<u>Background Readings</u>: We will post a background reading on Canvas at least two days prior to every lecture. Students are expected to read the articles prior to lecture to foster class discussion and this can be part of the participation grade. The exams may ask big

picture questions about the readings. You don't have to memorize every detail, if you broadly understood the reading you will get the questions right.

<u>Piazza</u>: You are encouraged to use our Piazza site when you have questions. The undergraduate TAs will be active helping students on Piazza, and we expect this to be a lively community. Always ask questions on Piazza first, including admin questions, because you are helping other students who have the same question.

<u>Office Hours</u>: The undergraduate TAs and the faculty have weekly drop-in office hours (see the schedule). You are welcome to come to office hours to get help with problem sets, the material generally, and preparing for exams.

<u>Textbook</u>: There are no required textbooks for this course. If you would like to use a textbook, we recommend *Intermediate Microeconomics with Calculus: A Modern Approach* by Hal Varian. Any edition is fine. While the class slides, problems sets, and practice problems have all of the content we expect you to know, the book may be a helpful additional resource. Professor Rakesh Vohra from the Penn Economics Department also has an excellent new book in preparation. We posted his current draft .pdf on Canvas, and it is an excellent resource if you want to study further.

<u>Past Exams</u>: There are many past exams on Canvas with solutions. While we are making this content available, the past exams should not be your main source to study because BEPP 250 has changed over the years. The past exams often cover different topics and have different types of problems, so we recommend that you primarily study through our practice problems and problem sets instead of the past exams.

Other Information

<u>Prerequisites</u>: Students need to have taken ECON 1, ECON 10 or an equivalent course. Students need to be comfortable with taking derivatives.

Attendance: Attendance in lectures and recitations is mandatory. Attendance will be recorded within 5 minutes of the start of each lecture and recitation. The class will have a seating chart so please be in your proper seat on time. Exams will be based on the material covered in lectures. Each student has a credit of three excused absences across lectures and recitations. This should cover religious holidays, illnesses, and other legitimate reasons for missing a class. Additional absences (beyond two) are unexcused and will lower your attendance grade. If you miss a class, you are encouraged to report and explain it using the Course Absence Report. CAR is solely for informational purposes; its use cannot hurt you (in particular, it will not affect your course grade) and could help you (by keeping Academic & Advising well-informed of any possible problems; remember, they are there to support you).

Ethics: We expect you to abide by the University of Pennsylvania's Code of Academic Integrity. Violations of the code carry serious sanctions. Violations include the altering of exams after we have returned the exams. In the spirit of discouraging any temptation to engage in such unethical practices, we keep photocopies of midterm and final exams before returning them to students. The faculty will turn all cases of code violations over to the Office of Student Conduct and reserve the right to impose additional sanctions, including a failing grade for the assignment / exam and the course.

Re-grading Policy: If you wish to dispute a grade on an exam, follow the steps below:

- 1) Carefully read the answer sheet posted on Canvas. Take at least 24 hours to think about the answers before submitting a re-grade request.
- 2) If you decide to submit a request, submit it in writing on a separate piece of paper and attach that sheet to your exam. **Do not write on the exam.** Additionally:

- a) For each part of the exam that you think was mis-graded, give a written explanation of your view.
- b) You must submit the entire original exam (not just the question(s) you wish to have re-graded). Your score could go down or up with re-grading.
- c) We reserve the right to re-grade the whole exam (even questions not requested for a re-grade).
- d) Submit your regrade request via email to the head TA Tony He (tonyhe@wharton).
- e) The deadline for regrade requests is one week from when the solutions are posted.

<u>Policy for Missing an Examination</u>: We expect you to attend the midterm and final exams. You will receive zero points for a missed exam, unless you have a medical or personal emergency or some unavoidable school-related conflict that is recognized and excused by the instructor. If you have a conflict, contact Beth Moskat in advance.
